Dear Members & Friends of 1stUPC,

All four Sundays in the month of March are in the season of Lent. We began our season of Lent on the last Wednesday of February with a combined worship service of the four downtown "First" Churches. That service consisted of scripture readings, prayers, our Highland Ringers sharing their talents, and the imposition of ashes. "Remember, from dust you have come, and to dust you shall return." Or as I saw on another Pastor's Facebook page, Bruce Reyes-Chow: "From stardust you have come, to stardust you shall return!" Bruce wrote that he mixed glitter into the ashes (maybe next year)?

Our theme, which was started on Ash Wednesday and will continue through these days leading up to Easter is summed up in a word: Frailty. As we contemplated the last Sunday of February about Paul's mysterious thorn in the flesh, we were reminded that we experience unexplained hardships, that we are a bad step away from an injurious fall, that we too have been jabbed in the soft parts of our lives and had to live with the pain.

These years since the onset of Covid our frailty has been on display before us. In my own life I find myself contemplating how fragile we are, how fragile I am, in spite of my considerable strength. However, there is something profound that we also get to claim in Paul's hope, God's promise that "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." The Lord himself gives us what we need, so that we can claim the paradox of faith, when I am weak, then I am strong."

So join us for worship during the Sunday's of Lent as we look at some of the ways that we are perhaps more fragile than we'd like to admit, and why that's a good thing. If we are willing to own the ways we are broken before the Lord, then we will see more clearly the ways his power shines through.

The definition of plaid, according to history, comes from the Gaelic term "plaide" which means blanket. Another interpretation is a long, rectangular piece of cloth, usually with such a pattern and worn across the left shoulder by Scottish Highlanders.

Technically, "plaid" isn't the correct word for a pattern that is usually known by that name. The appropriate word for the ancient patterns would be "tartan". All tartans are plaids, but not all plaids are tartans.

So, what is the difference? Accurate descriptions would be as follows: plaid is a word to describe a multi-colored cross-lined pattern. The word tartan is used to characterize the plaid associated with a clan, be it Scottish, Irish, or Welsh.

Plaid and tartan both contain horizontal and vertical lines that intersect at 90-degree angles. Tartans have an identical pattern of stripes running vertically and horizontally, resulting in overlapping square grids. Regular plaids are not necessarily the same in both directions with variation in size, color, and/or pattern of stripes.

There are Welsh, Irish, and Scottish tartans used in clan kilts. Historically, their patterns sometime came in the clan configuration, although in different colors, due to relevant circumstances. Red patterns were worn in battle so blood wouldn't show. Green resembled the forests for those who were hunters. The workers of the land wore yellow indicating crops. Blue symbolized lakes and rivers for those laboring in the waters.

If you are in the mood to purchase a kilt, some of the more prominent patterns follow these names: **Elliot, Fitzpatrick, Forsyth, Henderson, James, Jenkins, Kennedy, Lloyd, MacAlpine, MacKenzie, Smith, Stewart and Taylor.** Just be prepared to pay. This traditional garment could run you anywhere from \$490.00 to \$980.00!

But what better piece of clothing to wear on the anniversary of National Tartan Day? April 6, 1328 marked the date of the Independence of Scotland. A US Senate resolution passed on March 20, 1998 and was signed by late President George H. W. Bush to celebrate the first official Tartan Day. In March 2005, House Resolution 41 was unanimously adopted by the House of Representatives which officially designated April 6 as National Tartan Day.

Join the Presbytery of the Miami Valley on Saturday, March 4, 10:00 AM – 12:00 PM at Westminster Presbyterian Church of Piqua, for an Enneagram Workshop facilitated by certified Narrative Enneagram Teacher Abbi Rodriguez.

The Enneagram Workshop will invite participants to learn more about themselves and others through the compassionate lens of the Enneagram. In this workshop, certified Enneagram Teacher Abbi Rodriguez will offer a basic framework of the Enneagram for those that are new to this personality system. The workshop will also offer a greater depth of understanding in how we make decisions and approach relationships with others through a specific facet of the Enneagram called Stances. For those that don't know their Enneagram Type, you are invited to take a brief Enneagram Indicator prior to the workshop to help narrow down your Enneagram Type. Whether you've never heard of the Enneagram or you're an Enneagram enthusiast, this workshop is for you!

What is the Enneagram? The Enneagram is a tool used for personal development through an increased understanding of oneself. This tool defines nine personality types (known as Enneagram Types) based off of our core motivations, which in turn indicates a set of habitual patterns in the way that we think, feel, and act in our world. The Enneagram can help one make sense of their past, especially in regard to the tension and rubbing points one experiences in relationships, but it can also equip us to interact in a much more life-giving way in the present.


Why are Christians drawn to the Enneagram? The Enneagram is a helpful tool in illuminating the distorted beliefs of our personality (Enneagram Type) & the subconscious

strategies we have to get our needs met without God or God's people. The Enneagram clarifies the manner in which we are held captive by our shortcomings, habits, and defensiveness in ways that keep us from genuine wholeness & growth. John Calvin wrote, "Nearly the whole of sacred doctrine consists in these two parts: knowledge of God and of ourselves." The Enneagram invites us into greater knowledge of ourselves & a more compassionate lens to view God's people.


