Did you know??

It may surprise you that one of the most notable entrepreneurs of the American frontier didn't wear a jacket, tip his hat or shine his shoes, but rather dressed in a coffee sack, donned a tin hat and traveled barefoot.

John Chapman, better known as Johnny Appleseed, was a 19th century horticulturist who made great contributions to the westward expansion of the United States. Though he may not have traveled down the Allegheny River on a block of ice like his folk hero persona, he paved the way for countless frontiersmen to settle new land around his orchards.

Unlike a lot of other legendary figures of the American Midwest, Johnny Appleseed was a real person. Born in Massachusetts in 1774, John Chapman was a professional orchardist and nurseryman who began his travels to plant apple trees sometime in the early 1800's, armed with apple seeds he collected for free from cider mills.

Everywhere that Chapman traveled, he did more than just plant trees. And despite popular lore, he didn't just scatter apple seeds randomly wherever he went. Instead, he established entire apple nurseries by claiming land in the frontier where no one else had settled. Those orchards established legal land ownership in many settlement regions. He would plant these orchards, let them grow for a while, wait for people to settle in the region and then later sell off the trees for a high profit.

Sadly, at that time, the apples he grew were not worthy of a tasty experience. The trees he planted yielded small, tart apples that were destined for distilleries, where they were used to produce hard cider and the brandy-like applejack, two of the primary alcoholic beverages of the day. (This part was edited out of the legend pretty quickly!)

He considered himself a missionary of the New Church, preaching that God and nature are intertwined. As a child, John hoped to one day plant so many apple trees that no one in the world would go hungry. He preferred planting to grafting since apple trees grown from seeds can mature to any variety. This ensured that a variety of apples would be grown, providing a biodiversity in apples across the United States.

Most depictions of Johnny Appleseed describe him with a tin cooking pot on his head, threadbare clothing and shoeless feet. He favored a tin hat, which he frequently ate out of giving the legend a bit of truth. Those threadbare clothes and shoeless feet? Those were real.

Aside from planting apple seeds, he also carried and planted seed for medicinal plants. He was known to share these with the Native Americans he met along his way and was always welcomed into their company.

At the age of 71, John Chapman died near Fort Wayne, Indiana. He passed away seemingly wealthy, but his fortune did not last. Since he had never married and had no children, his sister was the beneficiary of his estate. His holdings may have been larger if not for two things: he didn't always record where he established some of his orchards and he had to sell some of his land during the financial panic of 1837. Unfortunately, most of what remained was sold off to pay his back taxes after his death.

The legend lives on as Johnny's great-great-great-great grandnephew, also named John Chapman, still maintains a few small orchards in Athens, Maine. At least one tree in his stock is reportedly descended from his forebear's own trees.

at Bellefontaine Middle School. Kenner retired in February of 2023, with 31 years of experience, all with the Bellefontaine Police Department.



HOW 'BOUT THEM APPLES!!

It takes about 36 apples to create one gallon of cider.

There are more than 2,500 varieties of apples grown in the United States, and they come in all shades of red, green and yellow.

The science of apple growing is called pomology.

Pilgrims planted the first US apple trees in the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

It takes the energy of 50 leaves to produce one apple.

Apples are members of the rose family.

The most popular varieties of apples in the US are the Red Delicious, Golden Delicious and Granny Smith.

Apple trees can live to be about 100 years old.

The fear of apples is known as Malusdomesticaphobia. This phobia gets its name from the scientific name of apples, which is Malus domestica in the Rose family.

The crabapple is the only apple native to North America.

Pork Chops with Apples and Stuffing

Ingredients

1/2 teaspoon butter or margarine, softened
2 teaspoons all-purpose flour
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
4 bone-in pork loin chops, 3/4 inch thick
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/4 cup sweetened dried cranberries

2 unpeeled red baking apples, sliced 1 teaspoon packed brown sugar 1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt 1 cup apple juice or apple cider 1&1/2 cups stuffing mix for pork or chicken 1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley

Instructions

Heat oven to 375°F. Brush 1/2 teaspoon butter in bottom of 13x9-inch (3-quart) glass baking dish. Spread apple slices in dish. In small bowl, mix flour, brown sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle over apples. Sprinkle seasoned salt on both sides of pork; place pork over apples.

In 2-quart saucepan, heat apple juice and 2 tablespoons butter to boiling over medium-high heat. Stir in stuffing mix and cranberries. Cover; remove from heat. Let stand 5 minutes. Fluff mixture with fork. Scoop 1/2 cup stuffing onto each pork chop.

Spray sheet of foil with cooking spray; place sprayed side down over baking dish. Bake 40 to 50 minutes. Uncover; bake 5 to 10 minutes longer or until pork is no longer pink in center and meat thermometer inserted in center reads 160°F. Sprinkle with parsley. To serve, lift pork chops with stuffing to serving plates; serve apples on the side.

Snickerdoodle Apple Cookies

Ingredients

3 cups + 2 tablespoons flour 1 teaspoon baking soda 3/4 cup butter, softened 1/2 cup brown sugar 1 & 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract 1/3 cup sugar 1 & 3/4 teaspoons ground nutmeg

- 2 teaspoons cream of tartar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 large eggs 3 cups diced apples
- 1 & 1/2 tablespoons ground cinnamon

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 350° degrees.

Combine the flour, cream of tartar, baking soda, and salt in a medium bowl. Set this aside. Add the butter, 1 cup white sugar, and brown sugar to a large mixer bowl and cream until light in color and fluffy in texture, about 2-3 minutes.

Add the eggs one at a time, mixing until combined after each. Scrape down the sides of the bowl, as needed. Add the vanilla extract and mix until well combined. Add the dry ingredients and mix until combined, then gently stir in the diced apples.

Scoop out $1\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoon balls of dough onto plates and freeze for 15 minutes or refrigerate for half an hour. Mix the remaining $\frac{1}{3}$ cup sugar with the cinnamon and nutmeg in another small bowl. Roll the cookie dough balls in the cinnamon sugar mixture, then set on a prepared cookie sheet (lined with parchment paper) with about 2 inches between them. Bake for 8-10 minutes.
