

While the eastern portion of North America is anticipating the total eclipse that will happen on April 8, there is another day that all of North America should be awaiting. **EARTH DAY!**

Earth Day is an annual celebration that honors the achievements of the environmental movement and raises awareness of the need to protect Earth's natural resources for future generations. Earth Day is celebrated on April 22 in the United States and on either April 22 or the day the spring equinox occurs throughout the rest of the world.

The First Earth Day was in April 1970. Because there was no EPA, no Clean Air Act, no Clean Water Act, there were no legal or regulatory mechanisms to protect our environment. In spring 1970, Senator Gaylord Nelson created Earth Day! This would allow him to force the issue onto the National Agenda.

In 1969, junior senator Gaylord Nelson from Wisconsin announced that he wanted to start a teach-in on college campuses to educate people about the dangers of air and water pollution. Senator Nelson, a well-known advocate for the environment, was joined by Congressman Pete McCloskey and activist Denis Hayes, the goal being to bring Americans together on the issues by creating a national celebration of the Earth.

Together they organized teach-ins on April 22 across the United States. They announced that April 22 would be called Earth Day, and their teach-ins turned into 20 million Americans taking to the streets "to demonstrate against the impacts of 150 years of industrial development which had left a growing legacy of serious human health impacts," according to the Earth Day Network.

The impact of the very first Earth Day was *huge*. It led to the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency, which still exists today, and some of our most important environmental laws being passed. The Clean Air Act, the Clean Water Act and more have been passed because of Earth Day's impact!

By 1990, Earth Day went global as 200 million people in 141 countries celebrated by calling attention to various environmental issues. Today, Earth Day is one of the largest secular observances in the world, with over 1 billion people participating each year. Earth Day is all about educating people about conservation, protesting against climate change and global warming and encouraging volunteering for the good of the planet.

The theme for Earth Day 2024 is "Planet vs. Plastics", which calls to advocate for widespread awareness on the health risk of plastics, rapidly phase out all single use plastics, urgently push for a strong UN Treaty on Plastic Pollution and demand an end to fast fashion.

How can we acknowledge Earth Day? One of the best ways to connect with the Earth is through cleanups. Go on a walk with a trash bag and help to clean up any plastic that you find. Perhaps you know of a nearby ditch or drainage area around the corner that is polluted with trash! Every little bit helps to make the Earth better for all of us!



season! **CONGRATULATIONS RICK!**



He was founder of the Eddie Albert World Trees Foundation and served

as the national chairman for the Boy Scouts of America's conservation program.

- *Earth is the only planet with liquid water.

- *It takes 24 trees to create one ton of paper.
- *The rainiest place on Earth is Northern India.
- *The driest place on Earth is Chile, South America
- *70% of the Earth is covered by water.

- *The Amazon Rainforest produces 20% of the Earth's oxygen.
- *20,000 people attended the first Earth Day rally in New York City's Union Square.
- *The Cuyahoga River caught fire in 1969 from all of the waste and pollution filling it.
- *The first Earth Day eventually led to the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency.


