What it means to be Presbyterian.

Someone asked me a few weeks ago why in some of the creeds it says, "Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church." We say Apostolic because we believe that our church is a descendent of the churches created by the apostles. That is to say that we aspire to be the kind of congregation and community that the church of Corinth, or the church of Emphasis aspired to be. It is away to say that we desire to hold fast to the foundation of our faith tradition. We say Catholic, not because we are tied to the Roman Catholic church, but rather we use catholic as an adjective meaning "denoting or relating to the entire body of Christians." This statement seeks to bond us to all Christian churches and is a way of saying though we acknowledge our differences we also recognize each other as fellow children of God and followers of Christ. And we say Holy meaning, "dedicated or consecrated to God or a religious purpose; sacred." We are a church loyal to our beginning, bound to each other and dedicated to God.





What's the Buzz? Bees are essential for the health of people and the planet. Honey and other products have medicinal properties, and the role of bees as pollinators makes them vital for food supplies.

There are around 20,000 known bee species worldwide, and over 4,000 are native to the United States. Humans only manage a few of these, and most species are wild.

As well as valuing bees for their honey, people have come to recognize the importance of bees in promoting food security and variety in plants and animals.

However, a rise in factors, such as pesticide use and urbanization, means that bees are currently in decline, negatively affecting many of the Earth's ecosystems. A loss of bees would affect honey supplies, but, more importantly, world food security and biodiversity. Without them, the world could be a very different place.

Bees are significant for many reasons. They have historical importance, contribute to human health, and play a role in maintaining healthy ecosystems.

Not all bees produce honey, but it is one of the main reasons people value them. The substance is a natural sweetener with many potential health qualities.

People have used bees and bee-related products for medicinal purposes for thousands of years. Some claims note it has antioxidant, antimicrobial, anti-inflammatory, and anticancer properties. In traditional medicine, people use honey when treating a wide variety of conditions. While many of these uses do not have scientific backing, they include eye diseases, hepatitis, hemorrhoids, eczema and ulcers.

In recent years, it has become clear that honey may not be the most important reason to protect bees. This is because bees play a crucial role in pollination, where they use the hairs on their bodies to carry large grains of pollen between plants. Roughly 75% of crops produce better yields if animals help them pollinate. Of all animals, bees are the most dominant pollinators of wild and crop plants. They visit over 90% of the world's top 107 crops. In other words, bees are essential for the growth of many plants, including food crops.

Bees are very intelligent, and people have applied knowledge of their mannerisms and social interactions when creating human initiatives. For example, researchers have suggested that studying the actions of bees could help experts develop emergency plans to evacuate people from an overcrowded environment.

Observing honeybee dances can also help scientists understand where changes are taking place in the environment. Farming practices, global warming, and disease are just a few reasons why bee numbers are declining. Experts are concerned about the impact on world food supplies, especially fruits, nuts, and vegetables. They say that without bees, there will be no more nuts, coffee, cocoa, tomatoes, apples, or almonds, to name a few crops. This could lead to nutritional deficiencies in the human diet, as these products are essential sources of vital nutrients.

**Not to drone on, but did you know we have a beekeeper in our very midst? Art Lloyd is an expert who knows his beeswax!!! We can swarm him with questions with his clear crystallization of answers! Our colony will be the sweetest, with his Queen, Betty!!



LASAGNA SOUP!

1 spoonful minced garlic

1 tsp. onion power

1 tsp. italian seasoning

Sprinkle of red pepper flakes

1 Cup heavy cream

10 - 12 lasagna noodles

Parmesan or Mozzarella Cheese

Mix together marinara sauce, cooked ground beef or turkey, chopped onion, broth and seasonings. Stir and cook on high for 3-4 hours.

Add in heavy cream and lasagna noodles. Cook an 30 minutes on high.

BEE TRIVIA

Bees have 5 eyes! Must bee hard to focus! Bees are insects, so they have 6 legs.

Male bees in the hive are called drones. Female bees in the hive are called worker bees.

Bees fly about 20 mph! Number of eggs laid by queen: 2,000 per day is the high.

Losing its stinger will cause a bee to die. Bees have been here about 30 million years!

An average beehive can hold around 50,000 bees.

Foragers must collect nectar from about 2 million flowers to make 1 pound of honey.

The average forager makes about 1/12 th of a teaspoon of honey in her lifetime.

Bees are important because they pollinate approximately 130 agricultural crops in the US including fruit, fiber, nut, and vegetable crops.




