

Lighthouses have long been used as beacons to call seafarers home, so boats could safely find their way into port.

The inaugural lighthouse in the United States was constructed in 1716. The "Boston Light" in Boston Harbor was the first in a long line of lighthouses built along the marshy coastlines from Delaware to North Carolina. They were generally made of wood. As to the round shape of the lighthouses, the explanation is as follows; "The circle is considered one of the strongest shapes because stress is evenly distributed along the arc instead of concentrating it at one point."

First lit on June 11, 1764, the "Sandy Hook Light" is the oldest surviving lighthouse in what is now the United States. Financed by a lottery, it was built by the Colony of New York to keep ships safe as they passed by Sandy Hook on their way to and from New York Harbor.

March 3, 1851, The U.S. Congress passed an Act Making Appropriations for Lighthouse, Light Boats, Buoys, etc. which led to the creation of the United States Lighthouse Board as the governmental agency responsible for the construction and maintenance of all lighthouses and navigation aids in the U.S.



Screw-pile lighthouses were used in the Chesapeake Bay and along the Carolina coast. A screw-pile version is a lighthouse which stands on piles that are screwed into sandy or muddy sea or river bottoms. They became popular after the Civil War when the Light Board approved a policy to replace lighthouses in the interior. Around one hundred of these complex structures were built on the Atlantic coastline spanning from Delaware to the Florida Keys and Gulf of Mexico.

In 1883, the "Stannard Rock Lighthouse" was completed on a reef twenty-four miles off the coast of Lake Superior in the Michigan area. It is a desolate beacon guarding against an underwater mountain, a place so unremittingly grim that it has been dubbed the loneliest place in the world.

Fun Fact: The Statue of Liberty, given to the American people as gift from France, operated as a lighthouse from 1886 - 1901. The statue could be seen by ships 24 miles away. It was closed due to operational costs.

The year 1939 brought an end to the era of keepers who lived in the lighthouses they were charged with when the Coast Guard stepped in. Since that time, the Guard has continued to oversee American lighthouses, updating and modernizing them.

The "Charleston Light" of South Carolina, known locally as Sullivan's Island Lighthouse, was commissioned on June 15, 1962, as the last onshore lighthouse to be built in the United States. While it is the youngest lighthouse in our nation, it is also the only one that contains an elevator.

In 1989, Senator Ted Kennedy sponsored a bill that required the Boston Light to remain permanently manned making it the only legislatively protected lighthouse in the United States. It was manned by the Coast Guard until 1998 and now is served by volunteer Coast Guard Auxiliary "keepers" whose primary role is to serve as interpretive tour guides for visitors.

There are currently more than one thousand active lighthouses in the United States. All of these lights have been automated and many others have been eliminated in the past, when they were no longer considered essential to navigation.





The crops of corn, beans, and squash are known as "The Three Sisters". For centuries these three crops have been the center of Native American agriculture and culinary traditions. It is for good reason as these three crops complement each other in the garden as well as nutritionally.

The tradition of calling these crops the "Three Sisters" originated with the Iroquois who planted in the order of corn, beans and squash to ensure they will grow and mature together and will not grow at the expense of another Sister.

The corn provides tall stalks for the beans to climb so they do not surrender to the sprawling squash vines. The beans are nitrogen fixers, meaning they host rhizobia on their roots that can take nitrogen from the air and convert it into forms that can be absorbed by plant roots. The large leaves of squash plants shade the ground which helps retain soil moisture and prevent weeds.



Hot Fudge

1 Cup Milk (must be at least 2% and for best results half and half.)

1 Cup Sugar

1/3 Cup Cocoa (Hershey if you can)

2 Tab Corn Starch

1/2 tsp Salt

1/2 Tab Real Butter

1 tsp vanilla

Start by placing all of the dry ingredients in a sauce pan and mixing them together.

Turn heat on medium to high and slowly stir in milk.

Stir continuously making sure the it does not stick to the pan.

When mixture is starting to boil, stir in 1/2 Tablespoon of real butter.

Let mixture boil until it is sufficiently thick then add 1 tsp of vanilla.

Remove from heat but continue to stir for a few minutes.

Spoon generously over your favorite ice cream, and enjoy.

This recipe can easily be doubled or even tripled.





With more than 115 lighthouses along the Great Lakes, Michigan boasts the most lighthouses of any U.S. state.

Adjacent to Fort Williams Park, the Portland Head Light is the most photographed lighthouse in America and the oldest in the State of Maine.

New Hampshire has only two lighthouses, both of which are located along the Atlantic coastline.

Ships must pay to pass a lighthouse. Light dues are the charges levied on ships for the maintenance of the lighthouses and other aids to navigation.

A lighthouse keeper's shift was 24 hours a day, 7 days a week! They could not call in sick and rarely took a day off. Keeps had to light the tower's lamp every night and make sure the lamp stayed lit until the sun rose the next day.


The last civilian keeper in the United States, Frank Schubert, passed away in 2003.


Hours spent handling and being exposed to mercury vapor during the maintenance of the heavy Fresnel lens caused health complications for keepers. Memory loss, mood swings, anxiety, deliriam and confusion resulted in numerous cases of keepers going mad or succumbing to alcoholism.
