
We have some exciting news from our Christian Education Committee, that we will be offering Confirmation classes beginning January 5, 2024 on Sundays after worship services. The program will run until February 23, 2024 with a Confirmation service on or after February 23, 2024. This will be offered for participants sixth grade and up. The curriculum we have chosen is discussion based and should provide a fun way for confirmands to engage in learning more about their faith traditions.

We are happy to report that the mission study team is now meeting with groups of people to continue their work in gathering information about First United, as well as Bellefontaine as a community. This team has worked diligently to build a profile of our beloved church community as well as articulating the vision that we as a congregation have for First United and Bellefontaine. Though we still have much to accomplish, we have accomplished a great deal during those six months. It is easier to measure things by what has been done or not done, but the true measure of the success of our time together, is in my opinion, the blessings that we share. Wendi and I have felt those blessings every day, and we are so grateful for the opportunity to share life with all of you. God blesses us in so many ways, but none more important or profound than those people that God puts in our paths.







What it means to be Presbyterian:

Someone asked me the other day about the sections of the biblical text. What they were referring to was the collections of books of the Bible by theme. I thought perhaps I would share what those are as perhaps a conversation starter for further discussion.

The Old Testament, or Hebrew Bible has 5 sections.

First is the Books of the Law also known as The Pentateuch or Torah. The word Torah in Hebrew means to teach or to guide. This sections is made up of: Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy.

The second section of the Hebrew Bible is Historical Books consisting of: Joshua, Judges, Ruth, I & II Samuel, I & II Kings, I & II Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah, and Esther.

The third section is Poetic Books: Jobe, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon.

The fourth section is Major Prophets: Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Ezekiel, and Daniel.

And fifth, is Minor Prophets: Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obediah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi.

The New Testament is made of up 4 sections with the largest possibly divided into two to make a total of 5 sections.

First is the Gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, the first 3 being known as the Synoptic Gospels as they largely agree with one another.

The second section is Historical Book, notice book not books, because this only contains the book of Acts.

The next section is the Epistles or Letters, here is the one that can be divided into the Epistles, and what some call the lesser Epistles. That term is not my favorite as what they mean by that is written by Paul or not. Sometimes they are referred to as Paulien, vs Catholic or General Epistles. Catholic meaning written to the whole church rather than to one specific audience and by also by someone other than Paul. Although there is some dispute about authorship for some, the epistles widely called Paulien are: Romans, I & II Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Phillippians, Colossians, I & II Timothy, Titus, Philemon, and Hebrews.

The General Epistles are: James, I & II Peter, I, II, & III John, and Jude.

And the final section is The Book of Vision which is the book of Revelation.

I hope that provides a little information that might spark other questions. I welcome and look forward to any conversations that may arise from this.

Did you know. . .

On September 14, we celebrate National Coloring Day, a vibrant occasion that invites us all to pick up some crayons, colored pencils, or markers and explore the therapeutic and creative benefits of this simple yet profound activity.

Of course, the most famous name in coloring would be Crayola, but where did it begin and what exactly does Crayola mean?

In 1885, the partnership of Binney and Smith began in Peekskill New York. Cousins Edwin Binney and C. Harold Smith began their journey with color by selling red pigment for painting red barns and carbon black pigment for car tires. As they experimented with various things, they soon found themselves opening a mill in Easton Pennsylvania producing slate pencils used in schools. In listening to the needs of educators, they formulated the first dustless school chalk, which was so successful it won a gold medal at the St. Louis World Exposition. (SAS Meet Me in St. Louis, Louis, meet me at the FairASA)

Noticing a need for safe and affordable wax crayons in the schools, the duo made the first box of eight, including the colors black, brown, blue, red, violet, orange, yellow and green. Those same colors continue in the eight-count box today. Alice Binney, a former schoolteacher and wife of Edwin, conceived the name in 1903, by uniting "craie", French for chalk and "ola", French for oily and thus Crayola was born.

Branching out to include more than just children, Crayola Rubens drawing crayons and Perma Pressed sharpenable fine art crayons are added to the growing line of products geared towards older art students.

Ever mindful of what could go wrong, 1936 sees Binney and Smith become a founding member of the Crayon, Watercolor and Craft Institute -today known as the Art and Creative Materials Institute- to promote product safety in art materials. In an effort to help art teachers learn about the many ways to use the growing number of Crayola products, a teacher workshop program was begun to offer inschool training across the country. It continues today.

Teachers, who thought children could no longer relate to Prussian history, prompted the very first of the crayon colors to have a name change. "Prussian Blue" was changed to "Midnight Blue". Quite an interesting change in 1958 but not the biggest one to come. That would be the debut of the iconic Crayola 64 Box with its signature built-in sharpener. When this classic turned forty, an original 64 box became part of the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History. Sixty-six years after the first box rolled out, it is still the perennial favorite!

Since 1978 and the appearance of the first box of Crayola Markers in eight bold colors, there has been an endless inventory of crayons, washable, twistable, or with colorless ink which bursts into color on special paper, gadgets to melt down old crayons and make new ones, window and mirror markers that can be erased, activity toys to bring more color outdoors, and digital tools to enhance your computer experience. All because of two cousins who loved color.

Since 2004, all states in the union are represented by a Crayola crayon color. Over 25,000 consumers Nominated an existing Crayola color and gave it a new state name. West Virginia Coal Miner, Minnesota 10,000 Lakes of Blue and Kansas Yellow Brick Road all have a nice ring to them, but I'll stick with Ohio.



Drizzle vanilla syrup over top of sponge cake. Let soak for 5 to 10 minutes.

3 Ingredient Sugar Cookies! Quick and easy sugar cookies made with only 3 pantry ingredients and no egg! So simple and foolproof, you can whip up this sugar cookie recipe anytime. Sweet, buttery, and delicious!

Ingredients

1 cup unsalted butter , room temperature 2/3 cup + 3 tablespoons granulated sugar , divided 2 cups + 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour , spooned and leveled

1 teaspoon vanilla (optional, but recommended) Add in some food coloring for a fun, festive treat!!





Instructions

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Line 2 large baking sheets with parchment paper. In a medium bowl, using a handheld electric mixer, beat together butter and 2/3 cup sugar until combined. (It will be a little gritty - that's ok.)

Add in flour and blend well (then blend in the vanilla, if using.)

Using a cookie scoop, roll the dough into 1-inch balls.

Gently roll the balls in the remaining 3 tablespoons of sugar until lightly coated; transfer to the baking sheets 2 inches apart.

With the bottom of a measuring cup or glass, press down on the balls to flatten.

Bake for 14-16 minutes or until just slightly golden around the edges and on the bottom.

Remove form the oven and let rest on the baking sheets for at least 10-15 minutes (don't skip this step!)

Then eat or transfer to a cooling rack to cool completely. Enjoy!

1990 For the first time in Crayola history, eight colors are retired. Maize, lemon yellow, blue gray, raw umber, green blue, orange red, orange yellow, and violet blue are enshrined in the Crayola Hall of Fame.

1993 For the first time, consumers are invited to name 16 new Crayola crayon colors in honor of the brand's 90th birthday! The list is highlighted by Purple Mountains Majesty, RazzMaTazz, Timberwolf, Cerise and Shamrock.

1996 It was a Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood when Fred Rogers of "Mister Rogers Neighborhood" molded the 100 billionth Crayola crayon named "Blue Ribbon".



1997 New colors are issues commemorating eight True Blue Heroes nominated by kids! These new colors include Outer Space, Mountain Meadow, Fuzzy Wuzzy, Brink Pink, BananaMania, Shadow, Torch Red and Purple Heart.

2000 A Census Year brought about the first online poll of the favorite colors of consumers. Blue ranked No. 1, with six other shades of blue - Cerulean, Midnight Blue, Aquamarine, Periwinkle, Denim and Blizzard Blue all finishing in the Top 10!

2003 Celebrating the 100th Birthday of the Crayola brand and making the world a more colorful place for children four new colors are introduced. Inchworm, Mango Tango, Wild Blue Yonder and Jazzberry Jam replace pink slipped colors Blizzard Blue, Magic Mint, Mulberry and Teal Blue. Almost a victim to this group was Burnt Sienna, however, more than 60,000 fanatics voted to save the shade.

During the 100-year celebration, the Crayola ART-rageous Adventure Tour took to the highways and brought the birthday party to cities across the country. Most notably was the bash in Easton Pennsylvania where a giant Crayola crayon was unveiled. Weighing in at 1,166 pounds, including the base holding it, it was 15 feet high, 16 inches wide and designed in America's favorite color, Blue.

2005 the Crayola company commissions a national survey that reveals if kids could erase a problem from the world, it would be violence. \$100,000 is donated by the company to Students Against Violence Everywhere (SAVE) to support anti-violence education programs.

2011 Edwin Binney is inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame, in recognition of his patented apparatus for the manufacture of carbon black. He received his patent 120 years earlier, May 26, 1891.

Solar power is utilized as Crayola installs more than 30,000 solar panels which produce 3 megawatts of electricity. This is enough capacity to supply 1 billion crayons and 700 million markers per year.

2012 "Edwin's Garden", dedicated by Sally Putnam-Chapman, great-granddaughter of co-founder Edwin Binney is displayed on Crayola property. Tended by employee volunteers, the yield of this garden is donated to local nonprofits to feed families in need.




More Crayola Trivia
